Because of our nature we need the atoning blood of Christ to bridge our failure to keep our part of the covenant. Jacob 2:50 tells us that three responses to being God's people are to lift our heads, receive the pleasing word of God and feast upon his love. When our hearts are pure, the Word is pleasing to us - we stay away from worldly lies that would try to distract us from the truth. Feasting upon God's love reminds us that we are nourishing ourselves with his love, taking it inside of



us so that it can become part of us and we can turn around and give it to others. If we are not God's people, we are warned in Jacob 2:51 to repent to avoid being cursed. The Lord is patient with us as we fight against our sinful nature and He has given us the Holy Spirit to help us, but there will be an end to the time we have been given to repent and judgement will be pronounced. Jacob 2:55-56 give us the example of the Lamanites who became more righteous than the Nephites. They were faithful to keep the commandment concerning sexual purity and because of it the Lord did not destroy them but was merciful. May we learn from them and be faithful in keeping the commandments.

We will close our retreat on Sunday morning with a communion service to reinforce all that we have learned about our covenant and the covenant maker. I hope you will come asking the Lord what he wants you to know about being part of



Book Report

Bait of Satan

If any of you reading this sat in on my "Rooted, Grounded, and Unoffended" class, then you will



know how much I recommend this book! I truly wish everyone could read it. What is it that Bevere is calling the "bait of Satan"? Taking offense. When we become offended, it causes rifts in relationships, which is just what Satan wants. So often this can cause division within families, friends, and churches. Bevere divides offense into two categories: those who have been genuinely mistreated and those who think they were mistreated but were not actually mistreated. Bevere dives into a multitude of examples of offense in the scriptures – those who took offense and those who did not – such as Cain and Able, Joseph, and even Jesus. He addresses many topics that many churches

deal with which are all rooted in offense. Bevere also tells how to remain free from offense – by being firmly rooted in Jesus Christ – and gives practical tips for ensuring we can be rooted in Christ and remain free from offense in our own lives. Also covered is advice on how to evaluate our own hearts for offense, what to do when we have caused offense, and how to forgive those who have truly wronged us. This is a worthwhile read, I promise you!

Mom's Testimony

I met my husband Gary at church in Miami, Oklahoma when we were both 12 years old. He had attended another RLDS branch before this time, however, it had closed, so you can say that we grew up in the church together. When Gary was a Senior in college, he was called to the priesthood office of Deacon. We married when we graduated from college.

Gary decided to make the Air Force his career. His second assignment was to Itazuke Air Force Base in southern Japan. Our son Kevin was between 2 and 3, and our daughter Barbara was born there.

This is the only assignment that isolated us from our church. We truly missed meeting with our brothers and sisters in our church. I decided to take Kevin to the Sunday School at the chapel on base, and I taught a Sunday School class there. Gary and I along with another couple were church youth leaders.

Apostles at that time were assigned countries to visit that had church members. We received a letter in January 1963 from Apostle Neff, in charge of Japan, asking if he could visit us on February 16th. Gary replied that we would be very

happy to have him visit. That day arrived. I fed and dressed Kevin and Barbara after playing with them awhile, then I took them to their bedroom to play while I worked on my Sunday School lesson. I went to check on them after a short time. When I went into the room, I found Barbara in her crib playing with toys and Kevin had placed a drapery cord around his neck and strangled to death. Now we knew why God had arranged for a priesthood member to be there that day.

God granted me a testimony with Apostle Arthur Oakman when I was emotionally distressed. We returned to the States immediately following Kevin's death. My parents cared for Barbara while I unpacked our household goods. While I was alone, satan convinced me that



Kevin's death was my fault. This was the week before Easter, and Apostle Oakman was conducting a series of meetings in Oklahoma City. I was an emotional mess by Friday. I went into the bedroom and knelt down by our bed and asked God to in some way use Brother Oakman to help me. At church on Sunday, we sat on the back row because the church was filled. He preached a very meaningful sermon on Life After Death. After the service was over, we were the first ones out to shake hands with him. I told him his sermon meant so much to me because our son had recently died. He looked me straight in the eyes and said, "Don't blame yourself." This lifted my heavy burden. What an amazing and loving God we have.

Story Behind the Hymn – 1871 – Verses by Mary Ann Fulkner – Tune by James Walch

Untold numbers of missionaries have been sent off to the regions beyond by congregations singing this rousing Episcopalian missionary hymn that exhorts the church ("Zion") to hurry and fulfill its mission of telling "all the world that God is light." But few realize it was written by a worried mother sitting at the bedside of her dangerously ill son.

Mary Ann Fulkner, the author of "O Zion, Haste," was born in London in 1834, and her family immigrated to America when she was young. After marrying John Thomson, the first librarian of the Free Library in Philadelphia, she and her husband joined the Church of the Annunciation (Episcopalian) in Philadelphia, where they served for many years.

Mary Ann, who enjoyed writing poetry, penned more than forty hymns, though only "O Zion, Haste" has lasted in the hymnals. This is what she had to say about writing her most famous hymn:



I wrote the greater part of the hymn,, "O Sion, Haste," in the year 1868. I had written many hymns before, and one night, while I was sitting up with one of my children who was ill with typhoid fever, I thought I should like to write a missionary hymn to the tune of the hymn, 'Hark, Hark my Soul! Angelic Songs are Swelling,' as I was fond of that tune, but I could not then get the refrain I liked. I left the hymn unfinished and about three years later I finished it by writing the refrain which now forms a part of it."

Most hymnals omit some of Thomson's original verses, one of which says:

Tis Thine to save from peril of perdition

The souls for whom the Lord His life laid down;

Beware lest, slothful to fulfill thy mission,

Thou lose one jewel that should deck His crown.
